



1 A He wasn't hired after the union was  
2 in place, if you're talking about the union  
3 timing. I thought he was hired before -- Well,  
4 he was hired before the contract was in place I  
5 should say.

6 Q Right.

7 A I don't know if the union was formed  
8 yet or not.

9 Q I'm not talking about the contract.

10 I'm just talking about the union being in place.

11 A Let's see, when was he hired? 2003?

12 Was it spring of 2003?

13 Q May of 2003 I'll represent to you.

14 A Okay. May of 2003. I think the  
15 union was in place then. I think it was -- I  
16 think it was -- Yeah, I believe that the union  
17 was formed by then, because was the union --  
18 When was it --

19 Q I'll just represent to you that the  
20 union was formed by then.

21 A Okay.

22 Q So do you know of anybody other  
23 than -- Or I'm asking, do you know if John  
24 Daryman went through the interview and/or  
25 application process before he was hired?

1 and again, talking about people that are outside  
2 the office coming in--I don't know.

3 BY MR. JACOB:

4 Q My question is any other detective.

5 A Yes.

6 Q Who?

7 A Well, if you're talking about  
8 internal transfers and posting, Doug Demangone's  
9 position was not posted when he was promoted to  
10 sergeant.

11 Q Okay.

12 A And if you're talking about in terms  
13 of transfers within the office from one  
14 detective position to another, when the openings  
15 happened, they didn't go through the same  
16 process. That's why I'm saying there's a  
17 difference between the two.

18 Q Between transfers versus hiring?

19 A Trans -- Well, see, when those  
20 positions are open, and that's why the detective  
21 hiring process was different. Let's say the  
22 STOP detective position became open --

23 Q Let's -- I want to get back to my  
24 question.

25 A Well, this --

1 A Firsthand knowledge --

2 Q Secondhand, thirdhand --

3 A No.

4 Q -- anything. Do you have any  
5 knowledge of it?

6 A Well, I'm going to divide between the  
7 two. Firsthand knowledge I wasn't a part of it.

8 Q Okay.

9 A Secondhand knowledge based upon  
10 the -- based upon what occurred afterwards  
11 between Becky and Stan and with the union  
12 affairs, no, he did not have the same interview  
13 process that the other detectives had.

14 Specifically, I think that there was an issue,  
15 if I recall correctly, of him never taking a  
16 polygraph; that that was one of the issues.

17 In terms of if he actually  
18 interviewed with people, I don't recall that  
19 coming up the same way, but the process -- The  
20 process was different. I mean, the process for  
21 John was different, and I'm trying to think --

22 Q Any other detective have the same  
23 different process that Mr. Daryman had?

24 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

25 THE DEPONENT: Hiring from outside--

1 Q Wait a minute.

2 A Okay.

3 Q Unfortunately, and I apologize. I  
4 know you're used to asking questions because  
5 you're a prosecutor, and I can certainly respect  
6 it. It's got to be hard for you to sit there,  
7 but today I get to ask the questions. I  
8 apologize.

9 A Well, I'm just --

10 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

11 THE DEPONENT: -- trying to answer  
12 completely.

13 MR. HUTCHINSON: He's not asking  
14 questions.

15 MR. JACOB: That's fine.

16 MR. HUTCHINSON: He's giving answers.

17 MR. JACOB: But to different

18 questions, so let me just reclarify --

19 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

20 BY MR. JACOB:

21 Q Let me just reclarify my question,  
22 and I think you'll understand where I'm going  
23 with this, because I understand your concerns.  
24 I'm not talking about transfers or promotions.  
25 I'm talking about initial hires. The first time

1 somebody comes to work for the D.A.'s office --  
 2 A Okay.  
 3 Q -- is there any other detective who  
 4 followed -- who was hired after the bargaining  
 5 unit was in place who got to follow the same  
 6 process that John Daryman followed that you're

 8 A That I'm aware of, no.  
 9 Q Okay. Now, do you recall when Miss  
 10 Downing was at the D.A.'s office, her making  
 11 complaints about the process that was being  
 12 utilized for the hiring of John Daryman?  
 13 A Yes, I recall -- Well, that's the  
 14 question you asked, so I'll just say yes, I  
 15 recall.  
 16 Q Okay. And do you remember that the  
 17 issues that Miss Downing was raising was that it  
 18 could create some sort of labor problem for the  
 19 county?  
 20 A Yes.  
 21 Q Okay. And do you recall her making  
 22 these complaints to Mr. Rebert and to others in  
 23 the D.A.'s office?  
 24 A Okay. For that question --  
 25 Q Let's start with Mr. Rebert. How

1 about that?  
 2 A Okay. I was not present during the  
 3 personal complaints to Stan Rebert. I know she  
 4 did complain to Stan Rebert because I know --  
 5 Well, both Becky told me that she complained to  
 6 Stan Rebert. Stan had mentioned that she  
 7 complained to him. Other people were in the  
 8 rooms at different times.  
 9 The John Daryman process I was not  
 10 involved in in a lot of those meetings. Now, I

 15 It was more so talked in terms of morale

 17 Now, I'll stop there because --  
 18 Q That's fine.  
 19 A -- that was the scope of your  
 20 question.  
 21 Q Right.  
 22 A But --  
 23 Q I appreciate that. And the morale  
 24 issue was, if I'm correct, was the fact that a  
 25 different process was being used and that it

1 would be disparate treatment of one detective  
 2 over another; am I correct?  
 3 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.  
 4 THE DEPONENT: There were two morale  
 5 issues. The first morale issue came about due  
 6 to how the position was created. That was the  
 7 first and primary morale concern I had because  
 8 it was going to affect the attorneys.  
 9 BY MR. JACOB:  
 10 Q Okay.  
 11 A The second one involved once he was  
 12 hired that there was going to be different  
 13 treatment, whether or not -- what it would do in  
 14 terms of morale concerns. That's --  
 15 So there were a twofold -- There was  
 16 a two-fold morale concern that was at bay. When  
 17 that detective position was created, we had to  
 18 give up an attorney's position, and at the time  
 19 we were feeling very understaffed with regards  
 20 to the attorneys.  
 21 Stan asked for the input of myself,  
 22 of Judge Kelley, who back then was First  
 23 Assistant --  
 24 Q Right.  
 25 A -- Paul Crouse and Susan Voyzey

1 regarding whether or not we felt that that  
 2 should be changed over. The four of us said a  
 3 resounding no, do not switch the position. He  
 4 talked in vagaries about John Daryman being  
 5 available and it may be a time to go ahead and  
 6 open up a position. He did not state  
 7 specifically that he wanted to create the  
 8 position for John Daryman.  
 9 We didn't care who it was for. We  
 10 felt no, because our big issue was, you know,  
 11 the attorneys are already saying that they're  
 12 overworked. We have this position, we haven't  
 13 filled it yet. Now we're going to take it away  
 14 based upon a promise that you may be able to get  
 15 back from the commissioners, who have already  
 16 been cutting our salaries. Who the reason why  
 17 we already -- why we had unionization in our  
 18 office across the board was because of the  
 19 problems we were having with dealing with the  
 20 commissioners economically, the disparate  
 21 treatment between our county versus other  
 22 counties of similar caseloads.  
 23 We just didn't trust it; that we  
 24 would get that position back, and we felt it  
 25 would be bad overall. It would hurt morale, and

1 Q During staff meetings or at any other  
2 time, was there a leak in the office in regard  
3 to confidential information?

4 A Yes.

5 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

6 BY MR. JACOB:

7 Q And was it ever discovered that Bill  
8 Graff was, in fact, the leak?

9 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

10 THE DEPONENT: I can only answer your  
11 question this way. I was with Bill Graff when  
12 he leaked information that was supposed to be  
13 confidential right after the meeting occurred  
14 concerning the staffing realignment. The two of  
15 us had to walk up into Judge Chronister's  
16 chambers together, and we had all agreed we  
17 weren't going to express it beyond that point.  
18 We walk in there and the first thing out of  
19 Bill's mouth was everything that we had just  
20 discussed.

21 BY MR. JACOB:

22 Q And that was in regard to the Daryman  
23 proposed promotion?

24 A No. That was with regards to a  
25 realignment of attorneys.

1 office in your opinion?

2 A Yes, yes. It affected the level of  
3 trust that we have in talking about information  
4 at staff meetings. At our executive staff  
5 meetings, for instance, whenever we talk about  
6 personnel, Paul Crouse refuses to be a part of  
7 it. He won't discuss any information like that  
8 with Bill around.

9 Q So am I correct, it's basically  
10 crippled your staff meetings?

11 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

12 THE DEPONENT: Staff meetings are  
13 crippled but for more reasons than that, but  
14 that had an -- that had an impact with personnel  
15 matters. When we were talking about attorney  
16 alignment and things like that, it would be  
17 Stan, myself, Lori Yost -- Now, this is since  
18 we've all held these particular positions:  
19 Stan, myself, Lori Yost, and Paul Crouse, and we  
20 will not discuss it at open staff meetings  
21 because Bill did that before, and I just don't  
22 want to put my hand in the fire.

23 (Ms. Downing left the deposition  
24 room.)

25 THE DEPONENT: You know, we all --

1 Q And I'm assuming that you went to Mr.  
2 Rebert and advised him that the information was  
3 leaked, correct?

4 A Oh, we all did. And that led into a  
5 spin-battle dual where Bill actually tried to  
6 blame me for being the one who was the person  
7 that leaked it up there. I wound up having to  
8 discuss it in Chronister's chambers after Bill  
9 had leaked it, because the way that I felt the  
10 spin came off of it was negative to the  
11 decisions that we did.

12 Q So this was a pretty serious issue  
13 for the office?

14 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

15 THE DEPONENT: I believe any time  
16 that confidential information leaves a room it's  
17 very serious.

18 BY MR. JACOB:

19 Q Was Mr. Graff disciplined for leaking  
20 information?

21 A No.

22 Q Was there an investigation into this  
23 leak?

24 A No.

25 Q Did it negatively affect the D.A.'s

1 None of us wanted to put our hand in the fire  
2 again. Why tempt -- It burnt us once, why tempt  
3 the flame.

4 BY MR. JACOB:

5 Q Did Mr. Rebert ever express to you  
6 that he lost confidence in Mr. Graff for leaking  
7 information?

8 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

9 THE DEPONENT: He's complained about  
10 leaks from his office. And he even said one  
11 time, he goes, you know, I'm beginning to think  
12 that my office is bugged with the way that  
13 information gets out there and swirls around  
14 before I have -- before I get to act on some of  
15 this stuff.

16 In terms of Bill being the -- Bill  
17 being a leak or a Chatty Cathy, yeah, Stan has  
18 expressed his disappointment with that. He's  
19 expressed that he's upset that he has done that  
20 on certain occasions. Yeah, he said so.

21 BY MR. JACOB:

22 Q What other occasions do you know of  
23 either first or secondhand that Mr. Graff has  
24 leaked information from the D.A.'s office?

25 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection. Counsel,

1 what possible, possible remote relevance does  
 2 this have to anything --  
 3 MR. JACOB: Pretext --  
 4 MR. HUTCHINSON: -- in this case?  
 5 MR. JACOB: -- insubordination. You  
 6 know where it's going.  
 7 MR. HUTCHINSON: No, I don't.  
 8 MR. JACOB: No discipline for  
 9 insubordination. That's a pretextual argument.  
 10 MR. HUTCHINSON: Who cares?  
 11 MR. JACOB: Well, we'll -- Argue it  
 12 to the judge later, Hugh. You know I have a  
 13 right to go here.  
 14 MR. HUTCHINSON: Actually you don't.  
 15 MR. JACOB: Actually I do.  
 16 MR. HUTCHINSON: This is well beyond  
 17 anything in this case. I mean, you didn't plead  
 18 a case that says, I just have --  
 19 MR. JACOB: You raised the issue --  
 20 MR. HUTCHINSON: -- to do anything  
 21 that's negative.  
 22 MR. JACOB: -- that it was  
 23 insubordination is one of the reasons that she  
 24 was fired. I get to prove that, in fact,  
 25 there's other serious acts of insubordination

1 MR. JACOB: All right. Then I'll ask  
 2 the judge for you to pay for them.  
 3 MR. HUTCHINSON: Because you've  
 4 wasted them?  
 5 BY MR. JACOB:  
 6 Q Now, going back to the question --  
 7 MR. HUTCHINSON: Counsel, come on.  
 8 BY MR. JACOB:  
 9 Q -- do you know of other times when  
 10 Mr. Graff has leaked information from the D.A.'s  
 11 office that Mr. Rebert is aware of?  
 12 A Beyond speculation or beyond specific  
 13 facts stated between Stan Rebert and myself, no.  
 14 No specifics.  
 15 Q Now, since you do like to clarify  
 16 firsthand, secondhand, why don't you tell us  
 17 about the secondhand information regarding that  
 18 issue.  
 19 A Well, this is just speculation.  
 20 Q That's fine.  
 21 A Basically, anything that happens in  
 22 terms of hiring, firing, promotion, all of a  
 23 sudden when we start to get contact from the  
 24 city police department or places like that, the  
 25 assumption is that Bill hopped on his Nextel and

1 that have gone without discipline. If you  
 2 really want to go to Judge Caldwell on this we  
 3 can. Judge Caldwell is going to tell you --  
 4 MR. HUTCHINSON: I want to save us  
 5 from being here for the next two weeks.  
 6 MR. JACOB: Well then, stop with the  
 7 objections that are improper.  
 8 MR. HUTCHINSON: No, no. Start  
 9 asking proper questions on relevant information.  
 10 MR. JACOB: I am, Hugh, and you know  
 11 it.  
 12 MR. HUTCHINSON: Absolutely not.  
 13 MR. JACOB: You know, we're twenty  
 14 something depositions into this. You know, I  
 15 know where this case --  
 16 MR. HUTCHINSON: And we haven't  
 17 yet --  
 18 MR. JACOB: -- is going.  
 19 MR. HUTCHINSON: -- touched on  
 20 anything really relevant. So let's get -- Let's  
 21 get to it.  
 22 MR. JACOB: Right. A page of  
 23 transcript wasted.  
 24 MR. HUTCHINSON: No, 80 pages of  
 25 transcript wasted.

1 began to work the network.  
 2 And in terms of the subject of rumors  
 3 and things like that, I mean, I've been told for  
 4 years by other people -- And again, this is  
 5 speculation, rumor. I've been told for years by  
 6 other people that he has basically run his mouth  
 7 about how he feels about individuals in the  
 8 office and about how things are going on to  
 9 people outside the office and starts rumors  
 10 going around.  
 11 You know, I'm getting hit with that  
 12 right now, where people are trying to draw  
 13 chain-links back to what all happened in terms  
 14 of me resigning and different issues like that.  
 15 When Julio was promoted to -- when he was made  
 16 chief county detective and other people were  
 17 calling.  
 18 I mean, this is -- We don't know,  
 19 okay. We don't have anything that you can go  
 20 ahead and say, yes, this is what happened. But  
 21 this is a speculation based upon -- And other  
 22 people that are all talking about it speculate  
 23 that this is where it came from. I mean, it's  
 24 become like the common-knowledge speculation.  
 25 Q But you do have at least the one

1 instance where it was leaked right in your  
 2 presence?  
 3 A It was right in front of me. I  
 4 couldn't believe he did it.  
 5 Q And has Mr. Rebert indicated to you  
 6 why he has neither investigated or disciplined  
 7 Mr. Graff for any leak?  
 8 A No.  
 9 Q Do you recall an incident in July of  
 10 '04 when Miss Downing raised the issue of a  
 11 possible harassment or sexual harassment in the  
 12 workplace involving a Josh Neiderheiser and a  
 13 Julie Patrick?  
 14 A I recall it happening. I wasn't in  
 15 the office that morning when it happened, but I  
 16 recall it happened.  
 17 Q Do you recall Mr. Rebert making a  
 18 statement, something to the effect of, did I get  
 19 caught stuffing a 20-dollar bill down Carletta's  
 20 bra?  
 21 A No.  
 22 Q You don't recall him making that  
 23 statement to you, and then you explained what  
 24 had actually happened in the office?  
 25 A No.

1 Q Okay.  
 2 A No, because I didn't know what  
 3 actually went on until Becky and Paul told me  
 4 about it.  
 5 Q Do you recall writing a written  
 6 reprimand for multiple offenses in regard to  
 7 Carletta for a warrant service, or something to  
 8 that effect?  
 9 A No, she wasn't reprimanded for  
 10 warrants. She was reprimanded -- Well, can I  
 11 just have this on the record for purposes of my  
 12 protection?  
 13 Q Go ahead.  
 14 A Since we're talking about -- And I  
 15 just want to put this on the record for all of  
 16 it. I'm assuming that I have absolute liability  
 17 because I'm under oath and compelled to make  
 18 statements concerning personnel matters and  
 19 personnel files and issues like that. I'm  
 20 assuming that that's the case.  
 21 MR. HUTCHINSON: We have a court  
 22 order that says none of this information in this  
 23 transcript will be released unless and until the  
 24 Court allows it.  
 25 THE DEPONENT: Okay. I just wanted

1 to make sure that that was on the record  
 2 because, clearly, what I'm going to go into is a  
 3 disciplinary matter that above and beyond  
 4 anything else is sacrosanct.  
 5 Carletta was reprimanded by Faith  
 6 Uhler Myers for excessive absenteeism.  
 7 BY MR. JACOB:  
 8 Q Okay.  
 9 A The warrant issue she didn't because  
 10 that involved fines for parking tickets that she  
 11 was told she had to go down and pay them right  
 12 away or, you know, she could get reprimanded.  
 13 And to my -- If I recall correctly, she did go  
 14 down and pay them.  
 15 But she was reprimanded for the  
 16 excessive absenteeism by Faith Uhler Myers. The  
 17 information was given to me regarding time and  
 18 attendance by Paul Crouse. I sat down with  
 19 Faith. Faith called Carletta in. Faith  
 20 reprimanded her, I witnessed it.  
 21 Q Did Paul Crouse object to any  
 22 discipline in regard to the warrants because of  
 23 an issue involving Judge Kelley and possible  
 24 warrants? Do you recall anything in that  
 25 regard?

1 A He didn't object, no. No, I don't  
 2 recall him objecting because of Judge Kelley,  
 3 and the warrant that -- You're referring to the  
 4 warrant that Judge Haskell's office gave when we  
 5 were working on the riot trial?  
 6 Q Yeah.  
 7 A That would be the issue. I won't go  
 8 off on aside with that. The answer is no.  
 9 Q Okay.  
 10 A He didn't object.  
 11 Q Do you recall Miss Downing  
 12 complaining about the sexual harassment incident  
 13 and a comment that -- previous comment regarding  
 14 Carletta's bra to Mr. Rebert, to anybody else?  
 15 A Carletta's bra, no. With regards to  
 16 the sexual harassment issue, she told me that it  
 17 happened and it was taken care of. Complaining  
 18 with how it was taken care of, no.  
 19 Q Okay.  
 20 A I did answer your question, right? I  
 21 answered the question you asked, correct? I  
 22 just want to make sure.  
 23 Q I'll let you know if you didn't.  
 24 A Okay.  
 25 Q Thank you, though.

1 A Well, by saying relocated, that  
2 implies that they had to have been missing from  
3 the office. I don't know that they were  
4 missing.

5 Q Wasn't a second set of photographs  
6 ordered?

7 A Oh, yeah. We had Roger Goodfellow --

9 wanted another working copy when I got involved

20 That issue of the photographs to me  
21 was serious, but not losing a case serious,  
22 because clearly, she wasn't altering or handling  
23 evidence in a way that would wind up hurting  
24 that case. The more serious issue was, was she  
25 at the scene?

1 to the -- and was bringing back to the office.  
2 But that was it. That was all that she would  
3 say.

4 Q Okay. And how about the Wynegars?  
5 Didn't they agree that they would take  
6 polygraphs?

7 A I don't recall. That I don't  
8 remember.

9 Q So based on the partial admission of  
10 Ms. Voyzey that she believes she at least  
11 possessed photographs at some point, Mr. Rebert  
12 just ended the investigation there?

13 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

14 THE DEPONENT: There was no  
15 investigation beyond what had occurred outside  
16 of Tom directly confronting -- or I should say  
17 His Honor now directly confronting. There was  
18 nothing further done by Stan Rebert as a  
19 follow-up of that meeting.

20 BY MR. JACOB:

21 Q Fair enough. Do you recall Miss  
22 Downing complaining about the fact that the  
23 investigation was ending at that point and that  
24 nothing was being done?

25 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

1 Q I understand that. I'm talking about  
2 the photographs, though.

3 MR. HUTCHINSON: I think he's

1 THE DEPONENT: Yes.

2 BY MR. JACOB:

3 Q Do you recall her expressing that to  
4 Mr. Rebert?

5 A Yes, at that meeting that was  
6 expressed. That was expressed by Becky, by Tony  
7 and by myself.

8 Q In regard to official badges of the  
9 D.A.'s office, do you recall Miss Downing ever  
10 complaining about the fact that parties who were  
11 not entitled to have badges possessed them?

12 A I recall complaints about having to  
13 order badges because we couldn't find as many  
14 badges as we were supposed to have.

15 In terms of people having badges that  
16 weren't supposed to have them, specifically, no.  
17 A complaint generally about badges, yes, and  
18 that was -- That wasn't to Stan. That was Becky  
19 and I talking because we -- We were supposed to  
20 have X amount of badges. When Becky came in, we  
21 couldn't find all the badges that we were  
22 supposed to have.

23 Q Do you recall Miss Downing  
24 complaining to Mr. Rebert about Miss Voyzey  
25 attempting to intervene either by displaying a

1 understanding was he was working a 32-hour  
 2 workweek.  
 3 Q Okay. And do you recall Miss Downing  
 4 complaining about that fact?  
 5 A Yes.  
 6 Q Do you recall a time when the  
 7 contract did come down for the bargaining unit  
 8 requiring a 40-hour workweek, and Mr. Rebert was  
 9 proposing to promote Daryman to a supervisory  
 10 position?  
 11 A Yes.  
 12 Q And do you recall Miss Downing  
 13 complained to Mr. Rebert that that would create  
 14 a further -- or possible further labor issue for  
 15 the county?  
 16 A I don't recall specifically her  
 17 saying labor issue. I recall her saying that it  
 18 would cause problems. The emphasis had always  
 19 been on morale. I don't recall -- I don't  
 20 recall labor issue. By labor issue I'm assuming  
 21 you mean like lawsuit, grievance, things like  
 22 that.  
 23 I know -- When Becky would mention  
 24 grievance it would be at the end -- I was only  
 25 ever at one meeting with her when John Daryman

1 was discussed. That was with Becky and with  
 2 Stan.  
 3 Q Okay.  
 4 A And it was at the end of the meeting  
 5 when -- going towards the end when she said, you  
 6 know that this could cause a grievance, and they  
 7 were talking about John in general. So that was  
 8 mentioned, but the primary focus whenever Becky  
 9 and I talked about it, which would be mainly in  
 10 Becky's office, would be about morale.  
 11 Q And the morale issue was the  
 12 disparate treatment, though, correct?  
 13 A Yeah. It would be the group of  
 14 detectives working one schedule and John was  
 15 working a separate schedule. The 32 hours never  
 16 seemed to be as big an issue as the  
 17 chain-of-command issue and the on-call issue.  
 18 The on-call issue was larger than the 32-hour  
 19 workweek because, the reason for the 32-hour  
 20 workweek was so that John could go to his place  
 21 in Potter County. That meant that he wouldn't  
 22 be able -- If he was up there, he couldn't work  
 23 on call over the weekend.  
 24 My understanding was, John had  
 25 volunteered to work the weeks for other people

1 if the weekends could be covered. But, that was  
 2 the bigger issue than the 32-hour fixed week,  
 3 the on-call part.  
 4 Q Miss Luker, the Director of Human  
 5 Resources, testified that she instructed Miss  
 6 Downing to contact Bob Durrant, the county's  
 7 attorney, at some point in time during the  
 8 contract negotiations or arbitration process to  
 9 clarify an issue, something in the contract.  
 10 Can you think of any reason why Miss Downing  
 11 should not have contacted Mr. Durrant at the  
 12 director's instruction?  
 13 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.  
 14 THE DEPONENT: Yes.  
 15 BY MR. JACOB:  
 16 Q What was that?  
 17 A That was -- The instruction from --  
 18 The instruction from the county was, do not --  
 19 that the elected officials, the department heads  
 20 were not allowed to contact Bob Durrant without  
 21 their approval. Becky Downing is not the head  
 22 of the District Attorney's office. If the D.A.  
 23 is not supposed to be contacting, the fact that  
 24 Sharon Luker went directly to Becky Downing,  
 25 that's issue number 1.

1 But issue number 2 is, Becky should  
 2 not have done that without talking to Stan  
 3 Rebert, because Stan Rebert is the person who is  
 4 in charge of the office. Yes, all the way  
 5 around there's protocol quagmire.  
 6 Q Okay. Who was it that gave this  
 7 direction from the county?  
 8 A That came from the commissioners from  
 9 what I understood.  
 10 Q And what form did it come?  
 11 A Was it through e-mail, phone call or  
 12 typed memo? It was in writing if I -- I believe  
 13 it was in writing. I know that that was  
 14 communicated within our office repeatedly by  
 15 Paul Crouse. I know that it was. They laid  
 16 that out in no uncertain terms. And I know that  
 17 we all knew that Bob Durrant was not to be  
 18 spoken to unless they approved of it.  
 19 Q And again, as you said, the direction  
 20 was that elected officials were not to contact  
 21 the county's attorney?  
 22 A Yeah. They were not to speak to Bob  
 23 Durrant unless they gave the okay. The first  
 24 thing was -- My understanding was that the first  
 25 thing that had to happen was that the elected



1 officials had to opt in to have Bob Durrant be  
2 their counsel. After they opted in, they  
3 weren't allowed to communicate with him. And  
4 the main reason why was to keep every elected  
5 official from being on the phone talking to Bob  
6 Durrant all the time. That was at least the  
7 information that was conveyed to us as the  
8 basis.

9 Q So then you're -- Am I correct then  
10 that you're assuming, though, that somehow that  
11 directive translated into everybody; not just  
12 elected officials were not supposed to contact  
13 Bob Durrant?

14 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

15 THE DEPONENT: Well, if Stan is not  
16 allowed to call him, why would I be allowed to  
17 call him? And that's the thing. I mean, we're  
18 the subordinates. We're not the ones who in the  
19 end are going to be -- have our names on the  
20 dotted line, so to speak. So if the head is not  
21 permitted, then why would the body be allowed  
22 to?

23 BY MR. JACOB:

24 Q Okay. But the directive was, elected  
25 officials were not supposed to contact Bob

1 it.

2 THE DEPONENT: I could be wrong.

3 BY MR. JACOB:

4 Q That's what I said --

5 A And I'll freely --

6 Q -- if there is.

7 A But I know that it was conveyed from  
8 over there to us, and we specifically had a  
9 meeting with that, on the topic.

10 Q When was that meeting on that topic,  
11 do you recall?

12 A That would have been -- I'm trying to  
13 get that time-line. That would have been  
14 when -- Would that have been in early 2002?

15 Q Okay.

16 A I'm fuzzy on the time-line because  
17 there were two -- the unionizations happened at  
18 different times. I can recall a lot of that  
19 action occurring when the secretaries unionized;  
20 when the teamsters unionization happened with  
21 the secretaries, because that affected all the  
22 department heads. It didn't -- It wasn't just  
23 the D.A.'s office issue then.

24 Q Did Mr. Rebert ever indicate to you  
25 that he contacted Gary Lightman during the

1 Durrant, correct?

2 A I--

3 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

4 THE DEPONENT: I believe it said just  
5 elected officials.

6 BY MR. JACOB:

7 Q Okay. And in regard to other  
8 attorneys, did it also -- Did it just say Bob  
9 Durrant, or did it say either attorney from  
10 either side should not be contacted?

11 A It just focused on -- It just focused  
12 on Bob Durrant. I think he was mentioned  
13 specifically. Well, I know it was said to us  
14 that he was mentioned specifically. But it  
15 was -- Bob Durrant was the focus of it because  
16 he was going to be representing the county, and  
17 the concern that was expressed to our office, I  
18 don't know whether it is verbally or in writing  
19 with that, was mainly to streamline calls. So  
20 Bob Durrant was the only one that was the focus  
21 of that.

22 MR. JACOB: Okay. Just for counsel's  
23 purposes, since there's a belief that this was  
24 in writing, could you just look to see if there  
25 is a writing to that effect? And if so, produce

1 arbitration process?

2 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

3 THE DEPONENT: No. He never told me  
4 that. In fact, I mentioned to him after I spoke  
5 with Becky during my -- during her last week in  
6 our office, after -- At one point I mentioned, I  
7 know I had to discuss issues that occurred  
8 during our conversation. And I mentioned, I  
9 said, you know, I said Becky said that you  
10 called -- that you called Lightman. I said, you  
11 know, this stuff is -- this stuff is outrageous.  
12 He didn't respond, but looked exasperated with  
13 like, you know, just like dismissive, like, you  
14 know, this is -- I took it to mean like, this is  
15 junk. You know, it was dismissive towards, you  
16 know, towards the accusation.

17 How that came up was, I was telling  
18 her why -- you know, about the feelings of her  
19 contacting Bob Durrant, and Becky said to me,  
20 well, is it right that Stan Rebert contacted  
21 Lightman? I had never heard anything like that  
22 before. And my response to her was, whether he  
23 did or he didn't -- My belief was that he  
24 didn't. Whether he did or he didn't, that  
25 doesn't change the focus on what you did with

1 regards to contacting Durrant. So that's the  
2 only Lightman issue that I have any part of with  
3 regards to that.

4 Q Okay. Have you spoken to Gary  
5 Lightman?

6 A Have I? No.

7 MR. HUTCHINSON: Let's take a few  
8 minutes.

9 (At or about 11:20 a.m., short recess  
10 occurred; resumed at or about 11:30 a.m.)

11 MR. JACOB: I apologize. When we  
12 broke I didn't make a note where I broke. Do  
13 you recall what the last question was? Is that  
14 easy to get back? I usually make a note where  
15 we break, and I didn't.

16 MR. HUTCHINSON: I thought we were on  
17 the subject -- or finished up the subject of her  
18 conversation with Durrant.

19 MR. JACOB: I think so.

20 THE COURT REPORTER: Yes, that you  
21 spoke to Gary Lightman.

22 MR. JACOB: Okay. That's fine.

23 Thank you. For the record I just thank you.

24 BY MR. JACOB:

25 Q We just took a short break. I

1 believe everybody needed one. We're back on the  
2 record.

3 Do you recall Miss Downing during her  
4 employ complain to Mr. Rebert in regard to his  
5 attempts to intervene in criminal prosecutions  
6 on behalf of friends, political supporters,  
7 relatives, people of that nature?

8 A I wasn't present when she -- If she  
9 did that with Stan, I wasn't there.

10 Q Are you aware through other people  
11 that the complaint was made to Stan about those  
12 issues?

13 A No, I don't recall -- I don't recall  
14 a complaint that Stan was doing so. Becky and I  
15 have had discussions if friends were involved  
16 about how to proceed in terms of taking it to  
17 Stan before getting Stan in the middle. I can  
18 think of a couple, specific; one of them being  
19 Joe Durney.

20 Q We don't have to get too far into  
21 stuff that's not part of the question.

22 A But that's the nature of the  
23 discussions that Becky and I had was about, when  
24 do you go to Stan because if it's a nothing  
25 issue, should he be put in the middle at that

1 point immediately? What we used to do was --

2 Q I'm just asking if you recall her  
3 making a complaint about his --

4 A Okay.

5 MR. HUTCHINSON: I think he can  
6 finish --

7 THE DEPONENT: No.

8 MR. HUTCHINSON: -- his answer,  
9 though.

10 BY MR. JACOB:

11 Q Okay. And how about, do you recall  
12 if Miss Downing ever made any complaints about  
13 Mr. Rebert having employees of the office  
14 perform personal favors for him?

15 A Not to sound obstructious or anything  
16 like that, but can you define personal favors?  
17 What type of -- Just so that I understand the  
18 scope of what you --

19 Q In general, if county employees while  
20 being paid by the county were performing  
21 personal favors to him, be it banking services,  
22 making phone calls for him, shoveling his snow,  
23 picking up his family, doing shopping for him,  
24 taking care of the pets, fixing a computer,  
25 starting a car, anything like that.

1 A So it's just in general, anything  
2 that could be of a personal nature?

3 Q Usual things that would fall under  
4 personal favors.

5 A Yes. What Becky complained about to  
6 him that -- I was present for this. When Becky  
7 first began with regards to Stan's lunch, Kenny  
8 used to go a lot to County Market and he'd pick  
9 Stan's lunch up at County Market, usually pizza.  
10 He'd go and he'd do stuff like that.

11 When Becky took over, I can recall  
12 her saying to Stan, I'm your chief county  
13 detective. I am not here to go drive and pick  
14 up your lunch and to do things like that for  
15 you. And Stan seemed to say -- I mean, Stan  
16 said okay to that then. I never heard that come  
17 as an issue again after that.

18 There was one time -- There was one  
19 time after that that I heard where they were  
20 talking about, I guess -- I can't remember what  
21 it was specifically they were talking about.  
22 And I remember Stan going, I know, I know.  
23 Look, I'm not asking you to go out and get me  
24 lunch or anything like that. And Becky goes,  
25 yeah, you better not. You know my feeling on

Page 114

1 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection. You just  
2 cut him off in the middle of an answer.

3 MR. JACOB: I'm sorry. I thought he  
4 was done because the question had been answered.  
5 BY MR. JACOB:

6 Q Was there anything else you wanted to  
7 share?

8 A No. That's good. That's all.

9 Q With regards to cell phones, do you  
10 recall if Miss Downing ever complained about  
11 cell phones being paid for by the drug task  
12 force fund for persons who are no longer  
13 employed by the D.A.'s office or for Mrs.  
14 Rebert's personal use?

15 A Susan Rebert, no. Persons formerly  
16 employed, yes. In fact, the cell phone that I  
17 have on me today used to be -- Rodney George  
18 used to have that. And Becky had asked Bill  
19 Graff, look, we should get Tim a cell phone  
20 because we need to be able to reach him. And I  
21 didn't have a county cell phone, and she wanted  
22 me too on the Nextel network. Bill Graff said,  
23 I'm not going to ask Rodney for his phone back  
24 until after we're done with--Was it Rosetti?--  
25 the Rosetti homicide. So when the Rosetti

Page 115

1 homicide finished, then Bill took the phone back  
2 from Rodney and gave the phone to me.

3 Q Okay. I'm only going to say just  
4 because we have another witness waiting, and  
5 we're late, not necessarily your fault, but --  
6 So the answer is you recall her making a  
7 complaint? We have to --

8 A Yes.

9 Q -- try to just answer the questions  
10 so we can get along here. I appreciate you're  
11 trying to be forthcoming.

12 How about as far as evidence not  
13 being in the evidence room and, instead, being  
14 either in Ingle's possession or Mr. Rebert's  
15 possession. Do you recall any complaints in  
16 that regard from Miss Downing?

17 A Yes and no. Complaints about how  
18 Kenny had the evidence, yes. Complaint about  
19 Stan with regards to evidence, no, other than  
20 generally that the safe was in bad shape.  
21 Complaints that existed about evidence and the  
22 fact we did not have an attorney -- a place  
23 where attorneys could keep the evidence of the  
24 cases they were in trial? Yes, that was  
25 complained of, but it was me to Becky. That's

Page 116

1 the yes and no.

2 Q Okay. So in regard to my question  
3 about whether Miss Downing complained about  
4 evidence that should have been in the  
5 evidence -- as opposed to Mr. Ingle or Mr.  
6 Rebert's possession, the answer is no?

7 A Well, she complained about the state  
8 of the safe. I mean, there was a general  
9 complaint. That was something that they had to  
10 get in compliance for the accreditation.

11 Q Okay.

12 A But if you're talking specifically  
13 like something Stan held, that -- No. That I  
14 don't recall.

15 Q Do you know anything about a slot  
16 machine in Mr. Rebert's possession that was  
17 possibly a confiscated slot machine?

18 A There was a slot machine in --  
19 Confiscated slot machine, was it in his office?  
20 That there was one?

21 Q How about his home, do you know?

22 A No, that I don't know.

23 Q How about video poker machines?

24 A There was a confiscated video poker  
25 machine back in the old church which we called

Page 117

1 the squirrel hut when we were working on the '69  
2 riot investigations.

3 Q Did it end up in Mr. Rebert's home or  
4 office?

5 A I don't know anything about his home.  
6 I'm trying to think in his office. The only one  
7 I can recall was, I think it was like a lever  
8 pull-down that was sitting against the far wall.  
9 I don't recall anything with a video poker  
10 machine.

11 Q How about a county couch? Do you  
12 recall a county couch ending up in Mr. Rebert's  
13 home?

14 A No, that I don't know anything about.

15 Q Prior to Miss Downing being fired by  
16 Mr. Rebert, I believe she and you had a  
17 conversation; is that correct?

18 A That's correct.

19 Q And during the conversation, am I  
20 correct that Miss Downing stated to you what she  
21 felt her complaints were about, what had been  
22 going on in the D.A.'s office involving Mr.  
23 Rebert; is that correct?

24 A I wouldn't -- Well, not entirely.

25 Q Okay.

1 A There were a couple specific things.  
2 But if you're talking about complaints, like  
3 many of the things that you were asking today,  
4 no, that wasn't the topic.

5 Q Did she ask you why this was the  
6 first time that she was learning that there were  
7 complaints about the -- from the A.D.A.s to the  
8 detectives?

9 (Pause.)

10 Q And I guess to clarify further --

11 A I'm trying to think.

12 Q -- why you as the First Deputy never  
13 brought them to her attention?

14 A No. I was First Assistant at that  
15 point.

16 Q My apologies.

17 A I don't recall her using those exact  
18 words. She didn't -- I don't recall her saying  
19 this is the first time. What I -- Do you want  
20 me to clarify what I recall?

21 Q Yes, please.

22 A Okay. What I recall being said with  
23 regards to the attorney complaints, I said to  
24 her that the detectives and the attorneys have  
25 no interaction any more; that the detectives

1 Q Do you recall was it ever discussed  
2 or are you aware of any time when Miss Downing  
3 was ever spoken to by her supervisor, who I'm  
4 assuming was Mr. Rebert, about this issue?

5 A Yes.

6 Q When?

7 A That occurred during a meeting  
8 that -- Lori Yost was trying to get assistance  
9 from the county detectives and she was getting a  
10 runaround on a case. It led to a huge blowup in  
11 Stan's office that wound up in a shouting match  
12 between Becky and Stan. I had to stand up in  
13 the middle of it and had to tell both of them to  
14 sit down because I didn't know who -- I mean,  
15 they were going at it really good.

16 I stood up between the two of them  
17 and I yelled at both of them. I said, both of  
18 you just sit down and shut up for a moment.  
19 And -- It was a blowup.

20 Now, after that, you know, Lori got  
21 the assistance that she needed on that  
22 particular case. When Lori needed help on a  
23 homicide after that, there was more ready  
24 assistance for her with regards to that case.

25 But help for the attorneys overall,

1 aren't there to help the attorneys, and the  
2 attorneys just know that they can't rely on the  
3 detectives. And Becky said to me, she said,  
4 that's not true. If anybody asks me for a  
5 detective's help, I'll give it to them. I can't  
6 help the fact that people don't come to me any  
7 more.

8 And I said, Becky, do you understand,  
9 nobody will come to you because when you've been  
10 shot down so many times you just give up and you  
11 don't go back to that person any more. And her  
12 response to that was, she took a pause and said,  
13 oh, I didn't think of it that way. I don't  
14 recall mention of the first time.

15 I will not dispute that in terms of  
16 thinking of it in that way, that that may have  
17 been the first time she thought of it that way  
18 based upon her reaction to me saying that nobody  
19 will come any -- come forward any more. But, we  
20 had gone to her previously.

21 The breakdown in communication  
22 between -- especially between her and I occurred  
23 during 2004, when literally you just became  
24 tired because you got shouted down. Things  
25 changed.

1 that was gone. I mean, my final issue with  
2 Becky occurred over me not being able to get a  
3 pair of latex gloves. They slammed the door in  
4 Dave Cook's face. I'm up there sick as a dog  
5 trying a first degree murder case. They slammed  
6 the door in his face because they're doing a  
7 disciplinary measure with Matt Millsaps. We're  
8 trying to find latex gloves so that I can have  
9 my expert open the evidence and show the bullets  
10 to the jury.

11 (Mr. Jacob and Miss Downing confer  
12 privately.)

13 When I talked to them afterwards,  
14 Tony apologized and said, I'm sorry, I didn't  
15 understand what Dave was saying. Becky's  
16 reaction to me was, you knew we were doing  
17 something important. I go, more important than  
18 me having gloves so I can introduce my evidence  
19 in a murder case? She said, well, you know how  
20 important this was.

21 Q So you did learn then it was Tony who  
22 slammed the door in Attorney Cook's face?

23 A Oh, he's the one specifically. It  
24 was Becky and Tony both in the office with Matt  
25 Millsaps. They opened the door. Dave was

Page 122

1 trying to talk to them to ask for gloves. And  
 2 Dave came up to me afterwards and he goes, you  
 3 won't believe what just happened. We were  
 4 trying the case together. And based upon  
 5 Becky's response to it, and with everything that  
 6 had come--That was August of 2004, about the  
 7 third week of August of 2004--too far gone. It  
 8 was too far gone.

9 Q Again, my question is, though, you  
 10 found out that Tony is the one who slammed the  
 11 door, correct?

12 A Oh yes, that's correct. Yes.

13 Q You also know at that time Attorney  
 14 Cook had not spoken to Miss Downing directly  
 15 because Tony had slammed the door, correct?

16 A No, he got to say a few words  
 17 generally to that room. He didn't get to fully  
 18 say everything that he wanted to express because  
 19 the door got slammed.

20 Q So you don't know then whether Miss  
 21 Downing heard what his request was or what the  
 22 issue was because Tony had slammed the door,  
 23 correct?

24 A If she fully heard and comprehended,  
 25 I can't say.

Page 123

1 Q Okay. But then after the fact you  
 2 explained and you guys had words, and whatever  
 3 happened happened.

4 A Yeah.

5 Q Was Miss Downing ever disciplined  
 6 over this issue?

7 A No, there was no discipline that was  
 8 done over this issue.

9 Q Okay. And this occurred, you said in  
 10 August of 2004?

11 A August of 2004.

12 Q Was Tony ever disciplined for this  
 13 issue?

14 A No.

15 Q So really, all we know is that Tony  
 16 slammed the door in Attorney Cook's face while  
 17 Miss Downing was in the room, correct?

18 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection. That's a  
 19 complete mischaracterization of what was being  
 20 said.

21 BY MR. JACOB:

22 Q Is that correct?

23 A No.

24 Q Okay. Now, in regard to the meeting  
 25 that you had with Miss Downing, am I correct

Page 124

1 that you and Mr. Rebert had discussed Miss  
 2 Downing's termination before you met with Miss  
 3 Downing, correct?

4 A That's correct.

5 Q And what was the reason that Mr.  
 6 Rebert gave for needing to fire Miss Downing?

7 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

8 THE DEPONENT: He never gave one.

9 BY MR. JACOB:

10 Q Okay. So then, what was the  
 11 substance of your conversation with Mr. Rebert?

12 A I'll cite back to earlier testimony.  
 13 When you're speaking with Stan Rebert you wind  
 14 up being the one talking, and then he leaves you  
 15 with the feeling of whether he agrees or  
 16 disagrees with your opinion, either expressly or  
 17 not.

18 Q I'm only interested in what the  
 19 actual substance was.

20 MR. HUTCHINSON: He's giving you his  
 21 testimony.

22 MR. JACOB: No. He told me that  
 23 he -- He's telling me about how he communicates.

24 BY MR. JACOB:

25 Q I just want to know what the

Page 125

1 substance of the communication was.

2 A Well, I will answer that as best I  
 3 can. I'm also cognizant that I'm going to be on  
 4 record. I don't want miscommunication for later  
 5 should this be in trial.

6 I'm walking down the hallway. Paul  
 7 Crouse is walking out of Stan's office and Paul  
 8 goes, Stan, you may be surprised over Tim's  
 9 reaction. He said, Tim, can you come here.

10 Now, Paul and I had been talking for  
 11 a while. This is the precursor of why Paul said  
 12 this. Because we had been talking for a couple  
 13 weeks about how we felt the detective bureau was  
 14 so far removed and detached from the A.D.A.s  
 15 that it was beyond repair to have them work  
 16 together as they should.

17 So he calls me in and Stan, I  
 18 believe, asked, Paul says that -- I think he  
 19 began by saying, I'm thinking about firing  
 20 Becky, but I'm concerned what your opinion would  
 21 be. Paul seems to think that I'll be surprised  
 22 by your response to know that the two of you are  
 23 friends.

24 I said, well, I said, Stan, my belief  
 25 is this. I believe that the detectives are

1 somebody gets them there.  
 2 BY MR. JACOB:  
 3 Q Once that meeting occurred and  
 4 apparently the process wasn't fixed, did Mr.  
 5 Rebert ever give a direct order saying, hey, the  
 6 process isn't working, here is what we need to  
 7 do?

8 A No.

9 Q Did he tell Becky in your presence  
 10 that this is what I want you to do to fix this  
 11 problem?

12 A No.

13 Q Okay. Instead, the suggestion was,  
 14 there's a rift in the office, there is a  
 15 problem, just fire her, correct?

16 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

17 THE DEPONENT: My advice was, if he  
 18 felt that she was not salvageable in the  
 19 relationship with him, that that relationship  
 20 was not salvageable, then he needed to  
 21 terminate.

22 BY MR. JACOB:

23 Q Once this litigation started, did the  
 24 detective office ever stop cooperating in any  
 25 degree with any of the police agencies in York

1 involvement from Stan and the attorneys. So,  
 2 I'm not trying to play a semantic game.

3 Q That's fine.

4 A I'm just --

5 Q Do you recall Mr. Rebert conditioning  
 6 his cooperation or the D.A.'s office cooperation  
 7 on Miss Downing being uninvited to the York  
 8 County Chiefs of Police meetings?

9 A He never said that or expressed that  
 10 to me. I personally, during the time period  
 11 that I was supposed to be going, didn't want to  
 12 go any more because I was getting mixed signals  
 13 from Stan and Julio concerning how warm they  
 14 were to me actually going. I know Julio had  
 15 expressed that he was uncomfortable because he  
 16 felt that things weren't settled.

17 In terms of Stan, Stan never  
 18 expressly came out and said that, but you just  
 19 know, when you've worked with somebody for a  
 20 while, something was going on in terms of him  
 21 not being happy. And I just didn't feel  
 22 comfortable.

23 Q I believe you've already testified  
 24 that you're big on the implications from Stan.  
 25 So, was it applied to you --

1 County?

2 A I don't understand the question. I'm  
 3 sorry.

4 Q Once this litigation started between  
 5 Miss Downing and Mr. Rebert, and I guess I  
 6 should clarify a little bit further --

7 MR. HUTCHINSON: Excuse me a second.  
 8 (Cell phone interruption.)

9 BY MR. JACOB:

10 Q Do you recall at any point in time  
 11 the York County Chiefs complaining of a lack of  
 12 cooperation by either Mr. Rebert or the D.A.'s  
 13 office after this litigation started?

14 A The chiefs specifically complaining,  
 15 no, I don't know if they did. I'm trying to  
 16 make sure I answer your question.

17 My understanding, they wanted to have  
 18 Stan be a full member. They wanted more  
 19 participation from our office. Stan had said to  
 20 me that he was uncomfortable going to the  
 21 meetings at the time because Becky was a member  
 22 and was still going to be attending. He asked  
 23 if I would attend, and I said I have no problem.

24 As a complaint, I don't view that as  
 25 a complaint. I viewed it as, we want more

1 MR. HUTCHINSON: Objection.

2 MR. BLAKEY: A little louder, please.

3 MR. JACOB: Yes.

4 BY MR. JACOB:

5 Q Was it implied to you, or did you  
 6 understand your interactions with Mr. Rebert to  
 7 be that he wants Miss Downing uninvited to the  
 8 meetings, and until that occurs, his office will  
 9 not be really cooperating or participating with  
 10 the York County Chiefs Association?

11 A The first part was expressed, he  
 12 didn't want Becky Downing at those meetings.  
 13 That he had expressed on numerous occasions.

14 The second part with regards to me  
 15 feeling uncomfortable, that's implied off of a  
 16 vibe. That's the only way I know how to put it;  
 17 off of a feeling based upon my discussions  
 18 with -- just in general about the chiefs. And  
 19 Stan would make references of like, well, you  
 20 know, our relationship isn't the best right now  
 21 with the chiefs and things like that. Yet, I'm  
 22 supposed to be going to help it, to make it  
 23 better and yet this is coming out of him. You  
 24 know, it's a mixed signal. And so, I'm getting  
 25 that feedback, and all of a sudden, you know

1 you're friends. Not only her and Bob, but also  
2 with her friends, and I don't want to get you  
3 caught up in the middle of it, and I'll do what  
4 I can to keep you out of this.

5 And I had told him verbally after  
6 seeing that, I said, I appreciate that. I am  
7 your First Assistant. If you need me to do  
8 something I said, I understand I have an  
9 obligation and a duty with my job. And he said,  
10 no, I'll keep you of it. And next thing I know  
11 I'm right back into it.

12 So, I go over to Stan. I said, Stan,  
13 I had an interesting conversation with Becky. I  
14 said, she came down to my office to ask me about  
15 her keeping her -- you know, keeping her job.  
16 And that she was supposed to come -- That if she  
17 could convince me, that you'd considered keeping  
18 her. And I said, Stan, what was that -- you  
19 know, what was that all about? And Stan looked  
20 up at me and goes, I'm sorry, Timmy, I was weak.  
21 Sorry about that.

22 I said, well, I said, we had a  
23 conversation, and basically I expressed what the  
24 reasons were, and I said -- and I told -- I told  
25 her what I told -- That was one of the things

Page 155

1 that I said. I told Becky what I told Stan with  
2 regards to, that Stan had to determine with the  
3 salvageable issue. Stan had to determine  
4 whether their relationship was salvageable. And  
5 if he believed it was, then he should work on  
6 it; and he believed it wasn't, that he should  
7 terminate her.

8 I said, I told her that, and I said,  
9 I think she understands what my position was  
10 with regards to this. He said, okay, thanks.  
11 And I said, Stan, I said, I would have  
12 appreciated you giving me a heads-up first, but  
13 I understand. I said, it doesn't surprise me  
14 that you were weak and that you needed to talk  
15 to me to have me do this, but I said, I  
16 understand it comes with my job. And that was  
17 that.

18 In terms of the other substance of  
19 it, I didn't tell him the further substance of  
20 the conversation.

21 Q I just meant the conclusion.

22 Last subject. You referenced you  
23 could go into Stan's office and say anything  
24 basically but it had to stay there, or with you  
25 it stayed there. Do you recall making a

1 statement like that?

2 A No.

3 MR. JACOB: I don't recall him making  
4 a statement like that.

5 THE DEPONENT: I said in terms of  
6 telling Becky that in terms of what we're  
7 talking about -- When I was talking to Becky  
8 that, you know, you can say whatever you want to  
9 Stan in there, but yeah, it needs to be -- we  
10 need to be working on the same page. It was  
11 something along those lines, in that context.

12 BY MR. BLAKEY:

13 Q Let me give you two more specific  
14 examples.

15 A Okay.

16 Q You indicated that at one point you  
17 yelled at both of them and told them to sit down  
18 and shut up.

19 A Yeah.

20 Q Did you have any hesitancy in talking  
21 like that to Stan?

22 (Pause.)

23 Q More specifically, did you think he  
24 would discharge you if you talked to him like  
25 that?

1 A (Pause.) Can you repeat the last  
2 part? Did I have any hesitancy with what?

3 Q In talking to Stan like that.

4 A I mean, look, nobody goes into a room  
5 to set out to talk that way. But in terms of  
6 saying those things and worse, no. I mean, you  
7 calculate when you do, a lot of times it was  
8 borne out of frustration and anger.

9 In terms of keeping things in the --  
10 I mean, yeah. I mean, I didn't have -- I didn't  
11 have hesitancy -- I mean, I didn't look forward  
12 to it, but if it happened, it happened.

13 Q You gave another example that you --  
14 talking about John Daryman. You and Becky, and  
15 I think maybe Paul went in and you all  
16 complained to Stan about taking the attorney's  
17 position and losing that and getting John; that  
18 you all complained to him about that, said he  
19 shouldn't do it.

20 A No, we didn't go into him. Well, Tom  
21 Kelley did. Tom Kelley didn't write a response  
22 memo. He just walked in to Stan and said, I  
23 read the other three memos. I agree with them  
24 totally, and you're idiot if you do what you're  
25 proposing. Paul, Susan and I wrote response

1 memos. He wanted us to write him memos  
2 concerning the issue.  
3 Becky and I had talked about it.  
4 Becky's position that she told me was, she said,  
5 well, she could use another detective position.  
6 She understood what I was saying in terms of the  
7 attorney slot. And, you know, that was pretty  
8 much it.

9 We didn't really talk about -- We  
10 didn't really talk about Daryman. We talked  
11 about the position specifically. That was what  
12 we were asked to talk about and we focused on  
13 Daryman as a potential candidate and how that  
14 would go wasn't the -- wasn't the driving force.

15 Q Did I just hear you say that now  
16 Judge Kelley said to Stan, you're an idiot if  
17 you do this, or words to that effect?

18 A Yeah, it was basically that.

19 Q My point is this, Mr. Barker. It's  
20 been stated that Stan had an open-door policy.  
21 Would you agree with that?

22 A Unfortunately, yes.

23 Q Well, fortunate or unfortunate,  
24 anybody could walk in at any time and pretty  
25 much say anything they wanted to Stan Rebert;

1 A I'm not aware. I don't know of any  
2 disciplinary actions that -- Well, I think Stan  
3 took one disciplinary action against her in  
4 2004, but he withdraw it.

6 A That's the only thing that I'm aware

23 a matter of fact, he gave the victim impact  
24 paperwork over to Becky to go ahead and

1 a lot of time. Paul's position, which I agreed  
2 with, was that he did not deserve a lot of time.
